This workshop covers the *what*, *who*, *why*, and *how* of compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. It offers a basic understanding of Section 106 compliance plus a more indepth analysis of such key issues as tribal consultation, coordination with the National Environmental Policy Act, using agreement documents, and strategies for avoiding common problems.

Taught by Dr. Lynne Sebastian, a former State Historic Preservation Officer and a nationally known expert in cultural resource compliance, the workshop emphasizes recent changes in federal regulations and the effect of those changes on the practice of Section 106 compliance.

Topics covered during the workshop include:

- ► Historic preservation in the United States
- ► The National Historic Preservation Act and other preservation laws
- ► Section 106: the process, the participants, and the potential pitfalls
- ► Coordination with the National Environmental Policy Act and Section 4(f)
- ► Tribal consultation and traditional cultural properties

This one-day, on-site workshop includes lectures, group discussions, and practical exercises to help participants apply what they have learned. All participants receive a notebook containing copies of the law, the most recent version of the regulation, a plain-English translation of the regulation, and other useful information.
